



Sustainability

Our new Pukeko Explorers' programme for our older preschool children has a primary focus on papatūānuku, getting outside into nature and learning how we can protect it for the future. The focus for term 3 is on learning about the wildlife in the Woodhaugh Gardens. Tamariki have a bird chart for when they observe birdlife and magnifying glasses to examine close up and have been fascinated by the insect life there.

This month in Dunedin the Council has introduced the green bins which supports us to further reduce the amount going into the landfill as well as saving our food scraps for Alice's chickens. If you have any sustainability suggestions for us, these are most welcome.

Tui Class

We are so proud to see so much determination in action as our friends are learning to sit, crawl, stand, cruise around furniture, ride bikes, climb and continue to challenge themselves through increasingly difficult climbing experiences, ka rawe!





Pukeko Class

Tamariki in the Preschool have been showing a strong interest in the trajectory schema. This is the urge of throwing and catching, as well as the movement of their bodies and objects. To support this we have a new swing ball set the tamariki are really enjoying. They are putting their hand-eye coordination skills to the test as they try and bat the ball to their peer standing on the other side, or back to themselves! We have also been fostering their urge to throw through experiences such as using targets. Tamariki have been throwing bean bags at a target, trying to hit the different numbers. This has also been encouraging their curiosity in numeracy.

The older tamariki are thoroughly enjoying our Pūkeko Hui Time on Thursdays. Over the past few weeks we have been focusing on shapes and we have had lots of fun exploring the properties of different shapes through interactive experiences. This has included things like creating pictures using wooden shapes and mini hammers, drawing shapes in salt as well as creating shapes using a variety of different materials.





Professional Development

This year as part of our ongoing professional learning we have been focused on culturally responsive teaching. We have had a few workshops alongside our regular team meetings to work on this internal review. Our focus has been integrating our centre values into our teaching and linking the Te Tiriti o Waitangi.

Improved safety

Our next renovation project is creating a new entrance for the preschool playground. This will be at the top of the driveway to the left. We will be creating a ramp up to the pathway so there will be two gates to get into the playground.
